Twitchy's insights have enabled him to share his own, often painful mental health to mental wealth experiences in such a way as to offer a real and immediately usable methodology that workplace leaders can now rely on to manage the mental health issues that face one in five of their people. The countless physical and psychological manifestations of our increasingly high stress, deadline fixated working lives are made clearer to understand and easier to change through his simple and effective system of positive mental health to mental wealth change.

Dr. Jim Withers has been an Industrial Hygienist & Safety Professional for nearly 30 years. His educational background includes a B.A. in Biology from Luther College and a M.S. in Preventive Medicine & Environmental Health (emphasis in Industrial Hygiene) from the University of Iowa. Jim also holds a Ph.D. in Industrial Technology from Iowa State University where his doctoral research focused on learning and retention differences between students taking chemical safety training on a computer versus in the classroom. Jim is both a Certified Industrial Hygienist (CIH) and a Certified Safety Professional (CSP) and has guest/adjunct faculty appointments at Iowa State University and Columbia Southern University.

Dr. Withers has also been a consultant to numerous companies on activities ranging from exposure assessments to training on a variety of topics including hazard communication and leadership development and is regularly invited to speak at local, state and national industrial hygiene and safety conferences. Currently, Jim is the Corporate HSE Director for the American Packaging Corporation in Story City, Iowa. In his current role, he has been focusing on developing a company-wide understanding of the interrelationships between human behavior, engagement, culture and safety performance.

The solution to the health crisis is to prevent the health risk factors that lead to chronic disease; to move beyond our reactive sick-care system to a proactive health care system built on the pillars of prevention.

Jack Beno Scholarship Foundation

When **Jack Beno**, age 60, lost a long battle with cancer in 1997, the safety world lost a truly inspirational leader. His ideas, guidance and tenacity contributed greatly to the many successes of the Iowa Governor's Safety Conference and to workplace safety and health throughout Iowa.

Jack was appointed to the Occupational Safety and Health Advisory Council in 1979 after accepting a position at Iowa State University. Jack's former students continually speak of the profound impact he had on their education and life experiences, and will never forget him or the lessons they learned.

The Jack Beno Scholarship Foundation was established in 1998 to provide scholarships for safety-related education in Iowa colleges. In honor of his memory, many former colleagues, friends, and students have made a contribution to support this cause.

Bill Dickinson Scholarship

Bill Dickinson served the State of Iowa through his work with the Iowa-Illinois Safety Council, ASSE, and Nationwide Insurance. His work with the council often overlapped with the Governor's Safety Conference, as he spoke and provided expert speakers on many topics.

Bill Dickinson and Bruce McCann were instrumental in the establishment of the ASSE golf outing that has funded much of the Jack Beno Scholarship fund. More importantly, Bill was constantly mentoring safety professionals throughout the state, encouraging them to excel in their work. Bill and Jack met on a number of occasions to discuss many safety issues affecting the state and the nation.

Gary Higbee captured the spirit and thoughts of many other EHS professionals and colleagues best, stating, "Both men (Jack Beno and Bill Dickinson) were men of honor and stature; I was fortunate to be their friend."

Douglas W. Martin MD, FAAFP, FACOEM, FAADEP, CIME, CEDIR

Doug Martin, MD, is a native of Louisville, Nebraska, a small town of approximately 1,000 people near Omaha that is famous for Ash Grove cement manufactured from the limestone deposits along the Platte River. He graduated with a Bachelor of Science in Biological Sciences with Highest Distinction in 1987 from the University of Nebraska - Lincoln. He went on to attend the University of Nebraska Medical Center receiving the Doctor of Medicine degree with Distinction in 1991.

Dr. Martin completed his family medicine residency in Davenport, Iowa. He was awarded the Mead-Johnson Award for Graduate Education in Family Medicine, given to the top twenty family medicine residents in the nation. Dr. Martin went on to complete a Mini-Residency in Occupational Medicine at the University of Cincinnati.

He serves as the Medical Director for UnityPoint Health – St. Luke's Occupational Medicine in Sioux City. The majority of his practice is related to musculoskeletal medicine, which is directly secondary

to the industry in the area; he often speaks of "meatpacking is my life" as he services one of the largest meatpacking facilities in the world in Dakota City, NE.

Dr. Martin has served on the Board of Directors for the American Academy of Disability Evaluating Physicians (now known as the International Academy of Independent Medical Evaluators) and is a Past President. He is a Past President of the Iowa Academy of Family Physicians and the IAFP Foundation. While Foundation President, he was involved in the finalization of the Iowa Health Rural Health Loan Repayment Program, a combined public-private endeavor. He was given the AADEP President's Award for Volunteer Service four different years and Freeman Award as Outstanding Educator in 2005, and the organization's first Lifetime Achievement Award in 2015. He was given the Janet M Wee Award by the IAFP for outstanding contributions to the organization. He is also currently on the Board of Directors of the Interstate Postgraduate Medical Association (IPMA).

He has given over 400 CME presentations on various Occupational Medicine topics, with emphasis on upper extremity repetitive motion injuries, disability medicine and medical review officer functions. He is currently serving ACOEM as the Course Director of the Musculoskeletal Examination and Treatment Techniques Course and the AMA Guides to the Evaluation of Permanent Impairment Course. He serves ACOEM as the Chair of the MRO Section and is the past ACOEM House of Delegates Speaker and member of the Executive Committee. He has authored ACOEM's official comments on the Federal Department of Transportation Revised Drug & Alcohol Testing Rules. In 2013, Dr. Martin was awarded the ACOEM Meritorious Service Award for his varied volunteer activities for the college.

He has served AADEP and ACOEM on their respective Education Committee and Council on Education. He has recently also been appointed to the American Academy of Family Physicians Commission on Education and Subcommittee on Graduate Curriculum. Having been on 6 different ACCME reaccreditation teams, he is highly involved in the planning and improvement of CME activities on a large scale. Dr. Martin has introduced varied teaching methods to many organizations, incorporating case-based educational tools and game show activities as an alternative to the typical didactic lecture formats.

He served on the Federal Motor Carrier Safety Administration's National Registry of Certified Medical Examiners Certification Work Integrated Product Team, a multi-disciplinary committee who was charged with creating the certification examination for providers who perform commercial driver medical examinations (DOT physicals).

He is an accomplished author, having written several articles for the *MRO Update* newsletter. He penned book chapters for three AMA books: *The AMA Guides to the Evaluation of Disease and Injury Causation, The AMA Guides to the Evaluation of Work Ability and Return to Work,* and *The AMA Guides to Navigating Disability Benefit Systems*. In 2015, he was the lead author and editor for the text *CRPS* –*What is the Evidence?* a project of Veritas Medicus, the AADEP Foundation. In the spring of 2018, his book, *Independent Medical Evaluations – A Practical Guide was* released by Springer Publications.

Dr. Martin serves as an expert witness for many medico-legal issues. He is frequently called upon by insurance carriers and state systems as an AMA Guides impairment rating expert. He provides consultation and reviews for many disability systems that center upon causation analysis.

On a state level, he is currently serving on the Task Force for Improving Preventive Health Care for Iowans with Disabilities and has previously served on task forces assigned by the industrial commissioner. On a local level, he serves voluntarily as the Superintendent of the Union County (SD) Board of Public Health and as the Medical Director for the Dakota Valley Emergency Services District.

Dr. Martin is a Diplomat of the American Board of Family Medicine, Fellow of the American College of Occupational & Environmental Medicine, Fellow of the American Academy of Family Physicians, Fellow of the American Academy of Disability Evaluating Physicians, Certified Independent Medical Examiner, Certified Medical Review Officer, an Aviation Medical Examiner, a designated Immigration Civil Surgeon, an arbitration examiner for the Nebraska Worker's Compensation Court, and a Social Security Disability Examiner for Nebraska, Iowa, and South Dakota.

He lives in Dakota Dunes, South Dakota with his wife Janet, and he has four children. He is a co-founder of the Tri State Youth Association (<u>www.tristateyouthsd.org</u>) and is both an Eagle Scout and Silver Beaver recipient, continuing to serve the Boy Scouts of America as Troop Committee Secretary. His assists his wife with a Haitian relief organization that she co-founded Time4Haiti (<u>www.time4haiti.org</u>). In his spare time, he follows the local high school and college sports teams, and is a substitute high school football official.

In 1996, the annual Governor's Safety & Health Conference safety award was renamed to the "Gary Hawk Safety Award" in honor of long-time OSH Advisory Council member Gary Hawk, who passed away after a long battle with cancer.

Describe how properly enforcing safety regulations can prevent injuries and fatalities.

Robert Luckey: Summarize the changes in the Fixed Ladder requirements.

Kelly Robison: Identify appropriate adhesions for intervention. Apply different techniques for addressing adhesions.

Adam Fairchild: Understand the importance of general lift safety and why use of fall protection and vehicle inspection are vital pieces of lift use.

Steve Flann: Identify the three key elements of a successful Business Continuity Plan. Outline effective evaluation of third-party Business Continuity vendors.

Kevin Harrell: Identify different rigging materials and which ones work where. Name which hitches to use for maximum load control and security.

Jason Wolf: Identify one or more techniques to use for electrical risk assessments. Identify one or more techniques to control electrical hazards and risks.

Jana L. Kray: Explain the importance of personal health in the reduction of injury and reduction of pain in the workplace.

Robert J. Bunte: Identify pressure equipment that may require safety inspection.

Chris Murphy: Explain how to apply the six-step risk management process to identify, analyze, control, and monitor both compliance and other risks in a manufacturing environment. Summarize the concept of a risk map to prioritize and manage risks in your organization.

Jonathan Lund: Identify when and where the fire code applies. Describe the necessary components of a complete Fire Prevention Plan.

Margret Meade: Describe the technical knowledge and skills that crane operators must possess in order to safely operate the crane. Explain the difference between qualified and certified operators and who may conduct each type of designation.

Claire Muselman: Outline an improved approach to their own workers' compensation processes and procedures. Explain how a strong workplace culture can have a drastic impact on claims from a personal health and workers' compensation standpoint.

Steve Nurre: Outline the principles and be able to implement this process of eliminating mistakes of production people, operators, mechanics, etc., from working on equipment that is not properly locked out.

Russell Perry: Summarize OSHA updates and how they affect employers in Iowa.
